"Lets Talk Coyotes" From Mayor Rick Olmsted

In the 12 years that we have lived here, we have heard coyotes howling and barking at night in the fields north of Donald. Recently, just before daylight, a group of coyotes came one block into Donald (on Chantal) and attacked a neighborhood cat. Fortunately, a neighbor witnessed

the attack, scared the coyotes away, and the cat survived. Examples of behavior that are of concern include coyotes that have killed a pet in broad daylight, approached people without fear and acted aggressively by growling or barking when subjected to negative stimuli, and following children. Hopefully, this will not happen, but if it does, please do not take matters into your own hands. Discharging guns, including pellet guns, inside Donald city limits is not permitted. Also, if you hunt on private property outside of the

Pet Owners Help Protect the Water System and Scoop the Poop

Storm Water Pollution: Storm water is runoff from rain and snowmelt. Under natural conditions, this water seeps into the ground. In urban areas, this water flows over impervious surfaces (paved areas and building rooftops), and does not percolate into the ground and accumulates debris, chemicals, sediment or other pollutants.

The Problem: Storm sewers are not connected to wastewater treatment plants or septic systems like the drains in your home are. When pet waste is tossed into a storm drain or left on the sidewalk, street or yard, it is carried by rainwater through the storm sewer system directly into our local water bodies, without any treatment!

Pet waste is a threat to human and environmental health because it contains harmful bacteria and pathogens, some of which can cause serious diseases in humans. Pet waste also contains many other nutrient pollutants, which contribute to excessive algae growth in a body of water, upsetting the delicate balance of the natural habitat.

The Solution: Being a responsible pet owner means

picking up after your pet. Here is how you can properly dispose of your pet's waste and prevent local water pollution:



Flush It: The best way to dispose of pet waste is to

flush it down the toilet. Just remember to remove the waste from the bag or the litter before putting it in the toilet.

Scoop the Poop: Bag it and put it in the trash. Landfills are designed to safely handle substances such as dog waste and cat litter.
