## **Water Update**

On August 1, 2018, the City was forced to enter into a Water Conservation Program where all customers were reduced to using water outdoors on Tuesdays, Thursdays, Saturdays, and Sundays, and eliminating other usages. We hand delivered notices to every home and business in Donald. The City is working to rehab the City's well so that more water can be drawn from the aquifer during times of peak demand. The City has a second well that has been out of commission for nearly a decade. Well professionals, and the City Engineer, are working on reactivating it.

### Being Water Wise with Mr. Jack Lindsey

Mr. Jack Lindsey has one of the greenest and best lawns in Donald, and he was enlisted as our "outdoor water conservation scientist". He started watering his lawn as per the guidelines from the Scotts grass seed company. Mr. Lindsay put out tuna cans throughout his lawn and sprinkled on watering days for about  $10\,$ minutes. Each can filled about half full. "There are a lot of variables in where you place the tuna cans", Mr. Lindsey remarked. "You can learn about your sprinkling system by using the tuna cans. The grass is a little drier now, but it's still pretty green." He continued "if you step in your lawn and it doesn't spring back up, then it needs more watering." He remarked about the intent of the Program "it's not about how much we spend, it's about how much we can save in water." City Staff wants to thank Mrs. Lindsey for making so many tuna sandwiches!

## **Community Service Award**

French Prairie Senior Deputy Todd Bay received the Sheriff's Office Community Policing Award on August 13, 2018 for his efforts as the French Prairie Deputy. Sheriff Jason Myers said "Community Policing is working together with our Community to solve livability and public safety concerns. In addition to this, Community Policing is about enhancing relationships between community members, the Sheriff's Office, and other public safety partner agencies about the common goal of making our community safe and stronger." Deputy Bay began his career in 1985 as a reserve for the City of Keizer. In 1988, he continued on his path of public service by volunteering as a reserve for Marion County Sheriff's Office (MCSO). Then in 1992 he was hired to a fulltime position with MCSO. For nearly a year he has served in this new position for our area. His job is now focused on community po-

licing, instead of primarily criminal issues like taking people to jail. He thoroughly enjoys his new position because he is helping to solve community problems. He is a second-generation policeman with MCSO, following in the footsteps of his dad. His dad's leadership with MCSO has served as inspiration for the type of police work he engages in now. "During the 50's, my dad had problems with teenage boys drag racing, so he setup a car club for them, gave them rules, and held them accountable." He continued "Later dad formed the first Boys and Girls Club in Salem." Sheriff Myers and Deputy Bay are pictured at Halls of Heroes at the Police Academy. Sheriff Myers said "Deputy Bay has exemplified the essence of Community Policing through all of his efforts and interactions. I could not be prouder of Senior Deputy Bay."
